

Proclamation


- WHEREAS,** on January 1, 1863, President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation, declaring that “all persons held as slaves within any State... shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free;” and
- WHEREAS,** more than two years would pass before the news reached Black Americans living in Texas, when on June 19, 1865, Union soldiers spread the word that slavery had been abolished; and
- WHEREAS,** Juneteenth was celebrated the following year and continues to be celebrated today, to acknowledge a period in our nation’s history that still shapes and influences our society, and to honor the principles of the Declaration of Independence; and
- WHEREAS,** the City of Olathe is committed to fostering a community that recognizes the value of each resident, that is strengthened by our diversity, and that celebrates the varied cultures and backgrounds that make up our great city.


NOW, THEREFORE, I, John Bacon, Mayor of the City of Olathe, do hereby proclaim June 19, 2024 as
