ITEM DESCRIPTION:

Consideration of a public hearing regarding the levy of special assessments to pay for the costs of Cedar Creek Parkway South of College Boulevard, Project No. 3-B-027-19.

SUMMARY:

On December 16, 2008, the City Council adopted resolution No. 08-1071, creating the Cedar Creek Parkway (south of College) benefit district, PN 3-B-075-08 and 5-B-048-08, which contemplated 2,850 lineal feet of a collector and 4-lane divided arterial roadway and 12" water line. The City Council subsequently adopted Ordinance 09-02 on January 6, 2009, authorizing the levy of special assessments within the benefit district. On July 7, 2009, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 09-33, accepting an amended petition to increase the total project costs for the project to \$7,738,757 with assessments levied over 10 years, equally per square foot, and on an annual basis within the district. This project has not been constructed.

On December 17, 2019, the City approved Resolution No. 19-1085 to create a new Cedar Creek Parkway (south of College) benefit district, with the road extending approximately 3,750 feet south of College as a 2-lane collector-style roadway and 12" water line. The proposed district includes a larger area south of College which will benefit from the improvements than the 2008 district.

On January 21, 2020 the City Approved Resolution 20-1013 (Attachment A) amending Resolution No. 19-1085. This resolution approved an amended and restated petition reducing the proposed project cost from \$11,779,981.82 to the corrected amount of \$9,395,108.94 to comply with parties' intent regarding the maximum cost to be assessed against property within the improvement district. This Resolution also called a public hearing for February 18, 2020 on the levy of assessments for the improvement district.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Properties within the district would pay 100% of the project costs, which are estimated at approximately \$1.01 per square foot.

RESOLUTION NO. 20-1013

A RESOLUTION AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 19-1085, APPROVING THE CREATION OF AN IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT FOR CERTAIN INTERNAL IMPROVEMENTS TO CEDAR CREEK PARKWAY SOUTH OF COLLEGE BOULEVARD, PROJECT NO. 3-B-027-19, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF K.S.A. 12-6a01 *ET SEQ.*, AS AMENDED AND SUPPLEMENTED; CALLING AND PROVIDING FOR THE GIVING OF NOTICE OF A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE LEVY OF MAXIMUM PRE-CONSTRUCTION SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS FOR SUCH IMPROVEMENTS; AND PROVIDING FOR CERTAIN OTHER ACTIONS AND THE GIVING OF NOTICE OF SAID HEARING.

WHEREAS, a petition (the "Petition") was filed with the City Clerk of the City of Olathe, Kansas (the "City") proposing certain internal improvements; and said Petition sets forth: (a) the general nature of the proposed improvements; (b) the estimated or probable cost of the proposed improvements; (c) the extent of the proposed improvement district to be assessed for the cost of the proposed improvements; (d) the proposed method of assessment; (e) the proposed apportionment of the cost between the improvement district and the City-at-large; and (f) a request that such improvements be made without notice and hearing as required by K.S.A. 12-6a01 et seq. (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, on December 17, 2019, the governing body of the City found and determined that said Petition was signed by the owners of record of more than one-half of the area liable for assessment for the proposed improvements, and was therefore sufficient in accordance with the provisions of the Act;

WHEREAS, also on December 17, 2019, the governing body of the City adopted Resolution No. 19-1085 authorizing the creation of an improvement district pursuant to the Act, for the purpose of making the following improvements:

The construction of Cedar Creek Parkway from College Boulevard south approximately 3,750 linear feet, to consist of two lanes with 12 inches of asphalt pavement. Said construction will be within 120 feet of dedicated right of way and include approximately 3,750 linear feet of 12 inch waterline. The improvements shall also include right of way grading and clearing, curb and gutter, sidewalk, hike/bike trail, erosion control, traffic control, curb inlets, storm sewer piping, landscaping, streets lights, utility relocations and related work necessary for completion of such improvements.

(the "Improvements"); and

WHEREAS, the extent of the improvement district (the "Improvement District") to be assessed for the cost of the Improvements is:

Part of Section 17, Township 13 South, Range 23 East, in the City of Olathe, Johnson County, Kansas, being more particularly described as follows:

Commencing at the Northwest corner of the Northeast One-Quarter of Said Section 17; thence North 87 degrees 45 minutes 51 seconds East, along the North line of the said Northeast One-Quarter, a distance of 240.00 feet to the Point of Beginning; thence South 51 degrees 47 minutes

58 seconds East, a distance of 1806.95 feet; thence South 01 degrees 51 minutes 59 seconds East, a distance of 1484.07 feet to a point on the South line of the said Northeast One-Quarter; thence North 87 degrees 42 minutes 53 seconds East, along the South line of the said Northeast One-Quarter a distance of 785.45 feet to a corner point on the West line of Lot 3, CLAREVIEW, a subdivision of land in the said City of Olathe; thence along the West line of said CLAREVIEW for the following ten courses, South 02 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 114.32 feet; thence South 47 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 140.00 feet; thence South 12 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 280.00 feet; thence South 02 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 170.00 feet; thence South 17 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 230.00 feet; thence South 27 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 120.00 feet; thence South 62 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 190.00 feet; thence South 32 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 250.00 feet; thence South 87 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 260.00 feet; thence South 32 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, a distance of 97.66 feet to a point on the South line of the North One-Half of the Southeast One-Quarter of Said Section 17; thence South 87 degrees 51 minutes 00 seconds West, along the South line of the said North One-Half a distance of 1449.82 feet to the Southwest corner of the said North One-Half; thence North 69 degrees 11 minutes 50 seconds West, a distance of 680.62 feet; thence North 29 degrees 40 minutes 15 seconds West, a distance of 418.87 feet; thence North 74 degrees 01 minutes 20 seconds West, a distance of 885.90 feet; thence North 32 degrees 11 minutes 27 seconds West, a distance of 376.12 feet; thence North 31 degrees 28 minutes 54 seconds East, a distance of 2407.77 feet; thence North 44 degrees 39 minutes 53 seconds East, a distance of 1078.49 feet to the Point of Beginning. Except that part taken or used for road right of way.

; and

WHEREAS, it was subsequently determined that the estimated total costs of the Improvements as set forth in the Petition and Resolution No. 19-1085 should have been shown as \$9,395,108.94 to comply with parties' intent regarding the maximum cost to be assessed against property within the improvement district; and

WHEREAS, on January 10, 2020, an amended and restated petition (the "Amended Petition") was filed with the City reducing the estimated total cost of the Improvements from \$11,779,981.92 as shown in the Petition to \$9,395,108.94 as shown in the Amended Petition;

WHEREAS, the governing body desires to accept and approve the Amended Petition, amend Resolution No. 19-1085 to reduce the estimated total cost of the Improvements to \$9,395,108.94 as shown in the Amended Petition, and further desires to approve the estimated total cost of the Improvements and the Assessment Roll, and call a public hearing to consider proposed assessments in accordance with the Act; and

WHEREAS, construction of the Improvements has not yet commenced, and pursuant to K.S.A. 12-6a10, the City has determined the maximum amount of the assessment against each lot, and an assessment roll has been prepared and filed with the City Clerk, a copy of which is has been reviewed by the governing body on this date (the "Assessment Roll"); and

WHEREAS, the governing body desires to approve the estimated total cost of the Improvements and the Assessment Roll, and call a public hearing to consider the proposed assessments in accordance with the Act.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OLATHE, KANSAS:

- **Section 1. Amendment of Resolution 19-1085, Section 1(b).** The governing body hereby approves and accepts the Amended Petition. The estimated or probable cost of the proposed Improvements as set forth in Section 1, subparagraph (b) is hereby amended as follows:
 - (b) The estimated or probable cost of the proposed Improvements is: \$9,395,108.94.

The remainder of Resolution 19-1085 shall remain in full force and effect and the governing body's adoption thereof is hereby ratified.

- **Section 2. Estimated of Total Costs; Assessment Roll.** The governing body hereby approves the estimated total costs of the Improvements in an amount not to exceed \$9,395,108.94, and further approves the Assessment Roll as prepared by the City and presented to the governing body on this date.
- **Section 3**. **Public Hearing**. It is hereby authorized, ordered and directed that the governing body of the City shall hold a public hearing on the proposed assessments, such public hearing to be held on February 18, 2020, at 7:00 P.M., at 100 E. Santa Fe, Olathe, Kansas, under the authority of the Act.
- **Section 4. Notice of Hearing.** The City Clerk is hereby authorized, ordered and directed to give notice of said public hearing by (a) publication of a Notice of Public Hearing once in the official City newspaper, such publication to be at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing; and (b) mailing to the owners of the property liable for the proposed assessments, at their last known post office address, a notice of public hearing and a statement of the proposed cost to be assessed against the land so owned, such notice to be mailed to be at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing.
- **Section 5. Further Authority.** The officers and officials of the City, including the Mayor and City Clerk, are hereby authorized and directed to execute all documents, publish all notices and take such actions as they may deem necessary or advisable in order to carry out and perform the purposes of this Resolution and the Act, including publishing a notice of public hearing related to assessments, and the execution or taking of such action shall be conclusive evidence of such necessity or advisability.
- **Section 6**. **Effective Date**. This Resolution shall be effective upon adoption. This Resolution shall be published one time in the official City newspaper, and shall also be filed of record in the office of Records and Tax Administration of Johnson County, Kansas.

A RESOLUTION AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 19-1085, APPROVING THE CREATION OF AN IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT FOR CERTAIN INTERNAL IMPROVEMENTS TO CEDAR CREEK PARKWAY SOUTH OF COLLEGE BOULEVARD, PROJECT NO. 3-B-027-19, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF K.S.A. 12-4-601 ET SEQ. AS AMENDED AND SUPPLEMENTED; CALLING AND PROVIDING FOR THE GIVING OF NOTICE OF A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE LEVY OF MAXIMUM PRE-CONSTRUCTION SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS FOR SUCH IMPROVEMENTS; AND PROVIDING FOR CERTAIN OTHER ACTIONS AND THE GIVING OF NOTICE OF SAID HEARING.

WHEREAS, a petition (the "Petition") was filed with the City Clerk of the City of Olathe, Kanasa (the "City") proposing certain internal improvements; and said Petition sets forth: (a) the general nature of the proposed improvements; (b) the estimated or probable cost of the proposed improvements; (c) the extent of the proposed improvement district to be assessed for the cost of the proposed improvement; (d) the proposed approtronment of the cost of the proposed exportionment of the cost between the improvement district and the City-ar-large; and (f) a request that such improvements be made without notice and hearing as required by K.S.A. 12-6a01 et seq. (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, on December 17, 2019, the governing body of the City found and determined that said Petition was signed by the owners of record of more than one-half of the area liable for assessment for the proposed improvements, and was therefore sufficient in accordance with the provisions of the Act;

WHEREAS, also on December 17, 2019; the governing body of the City adopted Resolution No. 19-1085 authorizing the creation of an improvement district pursuant to the Act, for the purpose of making the following improvements:

The construction of Cedar Creek Parkway from College Boulevard south approximately 3,750 linear feet, to consist of two lanes with 12 inches of asphalt pavement. Said construction will be within 120 feet of dedicated right of way and include approximately 3,750 linear feet of 12 inch waterline. The improvements shall also include right of way grading and clearing, curb and gutter, stdewalk, hikefolike nail, erosion control, traffic control, curb inlots, storm sewer piping, landscaping, streets lights, utility relocations and related work necessary for completion of such improvements.

(the "Improvements"); and

WHEREAS, the extent of the improvement district (the "Improvement District") to be assessed for the cost of the improvements is:

WHEREAS, it was subsequently determined that the estimated total costs of the Improvements as set forth in the Petition and Resolution No. 19-1085 should have been shown as \$9,395,108.94 to comply with parties intent regarding the maximum cost to be assessed against property within the improvement.

WHEREAS, on January 10, 2020, an amended and restated petition (the "Amended Petition") was filled with the City reducing the estimated total cost of the Improvements from \$11,779,981.92 as shown in the Petition to \$9,395,108.94 as shown in the Amended Petition;

WHEREAS, the governing body desires to accept and approve the Amended Petition, amend Resolution No. 19-1085 to reduce the estimated total cost of the Improvements to \$9,395;108;94 as shown in the Amended Petition, and further desires to approve the estimated total cost of the Improvements and the Assessment Roll, and call a public hearing to consider proposed assessments in accordance with the Act, and

WHEREAS, construction of the improvements has not yet commenced, and pursuant to K.S.A. 13-6a10, the City has determined the maximum amount of the assessment against each lot, and an assessment roll has been prepared and filed with the City Clerk, a copy of which is has been reviewed by the governing body on this date (the "Assessment Roll"); and

WHEREAS, the governing body desires to approve the estimated total cost of the Improvements and the Assessment Roll, and call a public hearing to consider the proposed assessments in accordance with

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OLATHE, KANSAS:

Section 1. Amendment of Resolution 19-1085, Section 1(b). The governing body hereby approves and accepts the Amended Petition. The estimated or probable cost of the proposed Improvements as set forth in Section 1, subparagraph (b) is hereby amended as follows:

(b) The estimated or probable cost of the proposed Improvements is: \$9,395,108.94.

The remainder of Resolution 19-1085 shall remain in full force and effect and the governing body's adoption thereof is hereby ratified.

Section 2. Estimated of Total Costs; Assessment Roll. The governing body hereby approves the estimated total costs of the improvements in an amount not to exceed \$9,395,108.94, and further approves the Assessment Roll as prepared by the City and presented to the governing body on this date.

Section 3. Public Hearing. It is hereby authorized, ordered and directed that the governing body of the City shall hold a public hearing on the proposed assessments, such public hearing to be held on February 18, 3020, at 7:00 P.M., at 100 E. Santa Fe, Olathe, Kansas, under the authority of the Act.

Section 4. Notice of Hearing. The City Clerk is hereby authorized, ordered and directed to give notice of said public hearing by (a) publication of a Notice of Public Hearing once in the official City newspaper, such publication to be at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing; and (b) mailing to the owners of the property liable for the proposed assessments, at their last known post office address, a notice of public hearing and a statement of the proposed cost to be assessed against the land so owned, such notice to be mailed to be at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing.

Section 5. Further Authority. The officers and officials of the City, including the Mayor and City Clerk, are hereby authorized and directed to execute all documents, publish all notices and take such actions as they may deem necessary or advisable in order to carry out and perform the purposes of this Resolution and the Act, including publishing a notice of public hearing related to assessments, and the execution or taking of such action shall be conclusive evidence of such necessity, or advisability.

Section 6. Effective Date. This Resolution shall be effective upon adoption. This Resolution shall be published one time in the official City newspaper, and shall also be filed of record in the office of Records and Tax Administration of Johnson County, Kansas.

ITEM DESCRIPTION:

Consideration of Ordinance No. 20-05, authorizing the levy of special assessments in the Cedar Creek Parkway (south of College Boulevard) benefit district, Project No. 3-B-027-19.

SUMMARY:

On December 16, 2008, the City Council adopted resolution No. 08-1071, creating the Cedar Creek Parkway (south of College) benefit district, PN 3-B-075-08 and 5-B-048-08, which contemplated 2,850 lineal feet of a collector and 4-lane divided arterial roadway and 12" water line. The City Council subsequently adopted Ordinance 09-02 on January 6, 2009, authorizing the levy of special assessments within the benefit district. On July 7, 2009, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 09-33, accepting an amended petition to increase the total project costs for the project to \$7,738,757 with assessments levied over 10 years, equally per square foot, and on an annual basis within the district. This project has not been constructed.

On December 17, 2019, the City approved Resolution No. 19-1085 to create a new Cedar Creek Parkway (south of College) benefit district, with the road extending approximately 3,750 feet south of College as a 2-lane collector-style roadway and 12" water line. The proposed district includes a larger area south of College which will benefit from the improvements than the 2008 district.

On January 21, 2020 the City Approved Resolution 20-1013 amending Resolution No. 19-1085. This resolution approved an amended and restated petition reducing the proposed project cost from \$11,779,981.82 to the corrected amount of \$9,395,108.94 to comply with parties' intent regarding the maximum cost to be assessed against property within the improvement district. A public hearing was held on February 18, 2020 on this matter.

Ordinance No. 20-05 (Attachment A) authorizes the levy of assessments within the benefit district. Assessments would be levied over 20 years, equally per square foot, on an annual basis within the district.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Properties within the district would pay 100% of the project costs, which are estimated at approximately \$1.01 per square foot.

ACTION NEEDED:

Adopt Ordinance No. 20-05, authorizing the levy of special assessments in the Cedar Creek Parkway (south of College Boulevard) benefit district, Project No. 3-B-027-19.

ORDINANCE NO. 20-05

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS ON CERTAIN PROPERTY TO PAY THE COSTS OF INTERNAL IMPROVEMENTS TO CEDAR CREEK PARKWAY SOUTH OF COLLEGE BOULEVARD, PROJECT NO. 3-B-027-19, AS PREVIOUSLY AUTHORIZED BY RESOLUTION NO. 19-1085 AND RESOLUTION NO. 20-1013 OF THE CITY; AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF SUCH SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS.

WHEREAS, the governing body of the City of Olathe, Kansas (the "City") has previously authorized certain internal improvements (the "Improvements") to be constructed pursuant to K.S.A. 12-6a01 *et seq.* (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the governing body has conducted a public hearing in accordance with the Act and desires to levy assessments on certain property benefited by the construction of the Improvements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OLATHE, KANSAS:

Section 1. Levy of Assessments. For the purpose of paying the costs of the following described Improvements:

Resolution Nos. 19-1085 and 20-1013 — Cedar Creek Parkway South of College Street Improvements

Description of Improvements: The construction of Cedar Creek Parkway from College Boulevard south approximately 3,750 linear feet, to consist of two lanes with 12 inches of asphalt pavement. Said construction will be within 120 feet of dedicated right of way and include approximately 3,750 linear feet of 12 inch waterline. The improvements shall also include right of way grading and clearing, curb and gutter, sidewalk, hike/bike trail, erosion control, traffic control, curb inlets, storm sewer piping, landscaping, streets lights, utility relocations and related work necessary for completion of such improvements.

there are hereby levied and assessed the maximum amounts (with such clerical or administrative amendments thereto as may be approved by the City Attorney) against the property described on Exhibit A attached hereto. Pursuant to K.S.A. 12-6a09(c), if the final cost of the completed Improvements is less than the maximum amount of the assessments shown in Exhibit A, then the governing body of the City shall adjust the assessments to reflect the actual cost of the completed Improvements.

- **Section 2. Payment of Assessments**. The amounts so levied and assessed in *Section 1* hereof shall be due and payable from and after the date of publication of this Ordinance. Such amounts may be paid in whole or in part within thirty (30) days from the date the City mails notice of the total final costs of the Improvements, after the completion of such Improvements.
- **Section 3. Notification.** After completion of the Improvements, the City Clerk shall notify the owners of the properties described in *Exhibit A* attached hereto (insofar as known to the City Clerk) of the amounts of their respective assessments. The notice shall also state that unless such assessments are paid within thirty (30) days from the date such notice was mailed by the City Clerk, bonds will be issued therefor, and the amount of such assessment will be collected in installments with interest.

Section 4. Certification. Any amount of special assessments not paid within the time prescribed in *Section 2* hereof shall be certified by the City Clerk to the Clerk of Johnson County, Kansas, in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are certified and will be collected in 20 annual installments, together with interest on such amounts at a rate not exceeding the maximum rate therefor as prescribed by the Act. Interest on the assessed amount remaining unpaid between the effective date of this Ordinance and the date the first installment is payable, but not less than the amount of interest due during the coming year on any outstanding bonds issued to finance the Improvements, shall be added to the first installment. The interest for one year on all unpaid installments shall be added to each subsequent installment until paid.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication of the Ordinance or a summary thereof once in the official City newspaper.

SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. 20-05

On February 18, 2020, the governing body of the City of Olathe, Kansas, passed an ordinance entitled:

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS ON CERTAIN PROPERTY TO PAY THE COSTS OF INTERNAL IMPROVEMENTS TO CEDAR CREEK PARKWAY SOUTH OF COLLEGE BOULEVARD, PROJECT NO. X-X-05X-19, AS PREVIOUSLY AUTHORIZED BY RESOLUTION NO. 19-1085 AND RESOLUTION NO. 20-1013 OF THE CITY; AND PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF SUCH SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS.

The Ordinance levies special assessments on certain property located south of College Boulevard, generally abutting the extension of Cedar Creek Parkway, which benefits from certain internal improvements to be constructed pursuant to K.S.A. 12-6a01 et seq. and provides an opportunity for prepayment, in whole or in part, of the special assessments. A schedule of the amounts of the special assessments and the property benefitted are attached to the Ordinance. Any amount of special assessments not paid within the time prescribed in the Ordinance shall be certified by the City Clerk to the Clerk of Johnson County, Kansas, in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are certified and will be collected in annual installments, together with interest on such amounts at a rate not exceeding the maximum rate therefor as prescribed by law. Councilmember Mickelson stated he wanted this item pulled to add a quick comment about this. Mr. Mickelson stated he does plan to support this project, however he does believe it kind of demonstrates a negotiation failure on the part of the city. Mr. Mickelson stated on December 17 of last year the previous council approved the ten-dollar sale of public land, the old library, and this land was worth approximately \$600,000. Mr. Mickelson stated had we sold that land for a 50% discount at \$300,000 we could have paid 100% for this new project. Mr. Mickelson stated this would have been a better use of the taxpayer dollars to work with the developer, try and get a little bit better deal out of this so that we could not turn around and immediately ask them for another \$300,000 of taxpayer dollars for a temporary library. Mr. Mickelson stated he thinks it was a failure of negotiation and a poor use of taxpayer dollars. Mr. Mickelson stated we need this downtown library, but he thinks we could have achieved it with a better deal with the developer. Mr. Mickelson stated he thinks we need downtown development, we need a downtown library, but he feels more conversation could have been had around how can the developer contribute to the better downtown and part of that would have been contributing to this temporary library. Mr. Mickelson stated we need the library, so he plans to support it. Mr. Mickelson stated he hopes we have better conversation up front and get a better deal with developers to help the taxpayers to not have to shoulder the burden themselves because basically they got hit twice, once on the sale of the land,

which he understands incentives are important and the 50% discount is still incentivizing the development, but that 50% discount could have been turned around and paid for this buildout. Mr. Mickelson stated that was his comment and he plans to support as a vital part of the downtown community and keep that downtown library without any delay in service. Mr. Mickelson stated he is ready to vote on it, but he wanted to add that comment.

Motion by Bacon, seconded by Vogt, to approve Consent item G. The motion carried by the following vote:

 Councilmember Mickelson had questions about the cost of the land for this project and asked where exactly it is located.

Public Works Deputy Director, Beth Wright, provided a map and identified the area in question.

Councilmember Mickelson asked why the cost was so high compared to other projects and Ms. Wright said that it is because of the narrow and unimproved section that would need to be built from the ground up. Mr. Mickelson asked why it was decided to build four lanes and Ms. Wright said it was because they were looking at future needs.

Councilmember Mickelson acknowledge this road is in poor condition but questioned if this is a project that should be considered at this time for the cost.

Councilmember Bacon mentioned when this was approved as part of the CIP in the Fall, the Council knew projects could change and he was open to delaying a short time to evaluate other options. Councilmember Brownlee expressed her concerns regarding the cost of the project. She indicated she appreciated Mr. Mickelson's questions but had been glad other projects in the past had been fully built out and not accomplished in stages. However, Ms. Brownlee supported delaying and utilizing the upcoming retreat to have more discussions.

Councilmember Vogt pointed out the decision was originally made not to make College Blvd. four lanes and it was a short time later that four lanes were necessary. She wanted to caution the Council since they are confident of the growth in this area and what will be needed. She said it would ultimately cost more.

Public Works Deputy Director, Beth Wright, mentioned some of the factors in determining this project were traffic flow, lack of sidewalks to elementary schools, crash rates, and future traffic predictions.

Councilmember Vogt asked what would happed if this was not approved and Ms. Wright said the project would not move forward.

City Manager, Michael Wilkes, indicated this has been in the CIP for several years and that there is also federal funding that has been approved for this project.

Councilmember McCoy said that he has had citizens ask when Pflumm Road was going to be addressed. He said there is no guarantee of federal funding later and it should be done now.

Councilmember Mickelson asked if the federal funding would be lost if the project did not proceed with four lanes. Deputy Director Wright said the project with four lanes was what was presented to obtain the funding and the funding would have to be turned back in if the project was modified.

Councilmember Mickelson asked if safety could be addressed with three lanes instead of four and Ms. Wright said it would be safer than it is today, but not as safe as four lanes. Councilmember Brownlee asked if there could be more discussion at the Council Retreat and Ms. Wright said the schedule could be met if it were delayed for two weeks.

Councilmember Campbell said he appreciated the discussion and thanked Ms. Wright for the information she had provided. Mr. Campbell made a motion to approve Item I and J and Councilmember Vogt seconded the motion.

Councilmember Bacon asked that as a courtesy to Councilmember Mickelson, there be a motion to table items I and J and the original motion was amended.

Motion by Bacon, seconded by Brownlee, to amend the motion and table items I and J, for two weeks. The motion failed by the following vote:

SUMMARY:

The City currently uses Columbia Capital Management LLC for financial advisory services. Columbia Capital performs bond advisory services. As part of the City's bond issuance process, Columbia Capital identifies bonds that are eligible for refunding and calculates the projected savings; facilitates bond ratings; assists with the preparation of the official statements; facilitates the competitive bidding process for bond sales; facilitates receipt of bond proceeds; and prepares closing documentation and debt amortization schedules. Columbia Capital is a key partner during the bond issuance process and works closely with City staff and the City's bond counsel.

The firm serves as the City's municipal advisor and registered as a municipal advisor with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission and the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board.

Columbia Capital assists the City with investments, best practices, forecasts, and any pending legislation that may impact the City at both the state and national level. As a registered investment advisor, they provide advice on investment of operating funds, bond and capital accounts, escrows, and other investment needs.

Columbia Capital also assists with complex analysis of proposed economic incentive projects as requested. They are an independent firm which provides advice that is free from conflict. They also assist with high-priority projects to determine the benefit of public-private partnerships by performing analytics and review documentation and economic structure.

The firm provides planning and development of the City's financial strategy in association with its capital improvement program and operating budget, assists with innovative approaches to funding and implementation of those long-term financial strategies. In addition, the firm will aid in marketing the City in the financial arena and assists with credit rating analysis and bond structuring.

The City initially awarded to Columbia Capital in 2012 during the request for proposal process. Staff recommends a one-year renewal with Columbia Capital through February 28, 2021. The firm as agreed to maintain current pricing.

The City spent approximately \$114,000 with Columbia Capital in 2019 and anticipates similar spending in 2020.

Charlesworth & Associates has successfully partnered with City staff to control insurance premium costs, review and settle numerous tort claims, recover over \$100,000 per year in subrogation efforts, strives to protect the property and assets of the City, and provides strategies and best practices to mitigate risk. Over the past three (3) years, Charlesworth and Associates has recovered through subrogation an average of \$137,645 per year.

Since 2012, Charlesworth & Associates has performed all these services for \$60,000 per year. On February 18, 2017, following an RFP process for risk management services, Charlesworth and Associates was awarded the contract by City Council to continue risk management services at the same rate of \$60,000 per year. The not to exceed amount of the proposal was \$65,000 per year and was guaranteed for three (3) years, with an option to extend for two (2) additional one-year terms. Charlesworth & Associates has agreed to extend the contract for the two (2) additional years at the same rate of \$60,000 per year.

Staff recommends continuation of the contract with Charlesworth & Associates for two (2) additional years at \$60,000/annually.

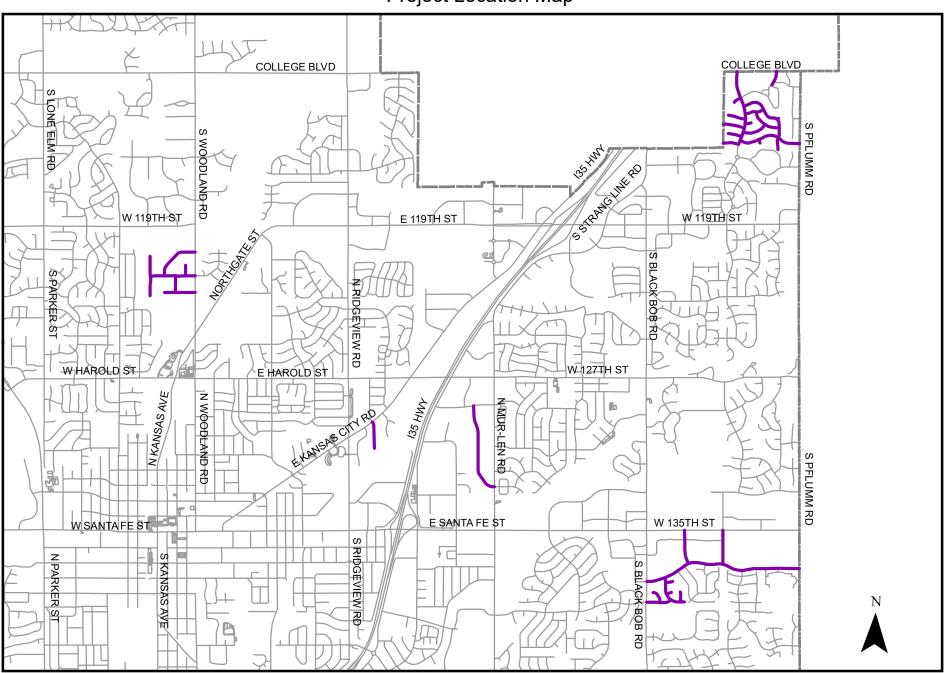

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE 2020 STREET PRESERVATION PROGRAM, PN 3-P-000-20.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF OLATHE, KANSAS:

SECTION ONE: Pursuant to the authority of Charter Ordinance No. 74 of the City, the Governing Body hereby authorizes the 2020 Street Preservation Program. Such program shall rehabilitate the following streets in the City of Olathe:

Santa Fe Street Arterial Mill and Overlay Project – Kansas City Road to I-35. The project funding consists of CIP Fund Cash and Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash. The project will be bid and constructed in coordination with the Santa Fe and Ridgeview Geometric Improvements Project.

<u>127th Street Arterial Mill and Overlay Project</u> – Moore Avenue to Black Bob Road. The project funding consists of CIP Fund Cash, Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash and Johnson County CARS Program.

<u>Ridgeview Road Arterial Mill and Overlay Project</u> – 151st Street to 159th Street. The project funding consists of CIP Fund Cash and Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash.

Old 56 Highway Arterial Mill and Overlay Project – 151st Street to Lone Elm Road. Alternate Project. The project funding consists of CIP Fund Cash and Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash.

<u>Cedar Creek Parkway Arterial Mill and Overlay Project</u> – K-10 Highway to the south end. Alternate Project. The project funding consists of CIP Fund Cash and Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash.

<u>Local and Collector Street Mill and Overlay Projects</u> – See street list exhibits. for (**Exhibit A**). The project includes 68 streets totaling 28 lane miles. The project funding consists of General Obligation (G.O.) Bonds, CIP Fund Cash and Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash.

<u>Micro Surface Project</u> – See street list exhibits (**Exhibit B**). The project includes Type II Micro Surface on approximately 174 streets, totaling 61 lane miles. The project funding consists of CPR Fund Cash and Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash.

<u>Street Maintenance Curb Replacement Project</u> – Removal and replacement of approximately 25,000 linear feet of deteriorated curb and gutter by Street Maintenance Concrete Crews in multiple locations throughout Olathe. The project funding consists of Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash.

<u>Street Maintenance Crack Sealing Project</u> – Crack sealing materials for approximately 250 lane miles to be applied by Street Maintenance Crews. The project funding consists of Street Maintenance Sales Tax Cash.

<u>Design of 2021 Arterial Mill and Overlay Projects</u> – Design costs for 2021 Arterial Mill and Overlay Projects will utilize 2020 CIP Fund Cash and/or Street Maintenance Sales Tax Funds. The following projects are currently included, but are not limited to:

Mur-Len Road, Santa Fe Street to Rogers Road 159th Street, US-169 Highway to Brougham Drive Ridgeview Road, Sheridan Street to Santa Fe Street

Alternate Streets are included in the Street Listings for the Local and Collector Mill and Overlay and Micro Surface Projects. The alternate streets are not included in the total number of primary streets and lane miles listed above with each project. These alternate streets are authorized for construction but not currently scheduled for construction.

SECTION TWO: The cost for completing the projects listed in Section One is \$13,600,000. Funds to pay for the projects shall come from the following sources:

SECTION THREE: Pursuant to the authority of Charter Ordinance No. 74, the Governing Body hereby authorizes the issuance of not to exceed \$1,000,000 of general obligation bonds, all exclusive of issuance costs and interest on any temporary financing.

SECTION FOUR: The City intends to reimburse itself for capital expenditures made on or after the date which is 60 days before the date of this Resolution in connection with the project, pursuant to Treasury Regulation § 1.150-2, with the proceeds of bonds and/or notes in the maximum principal amount of \$1,000,000 exclusive of issuance costs and any interest costs for temporary financing.

SECTION FIVE: This Resolution shall take effect immediately.

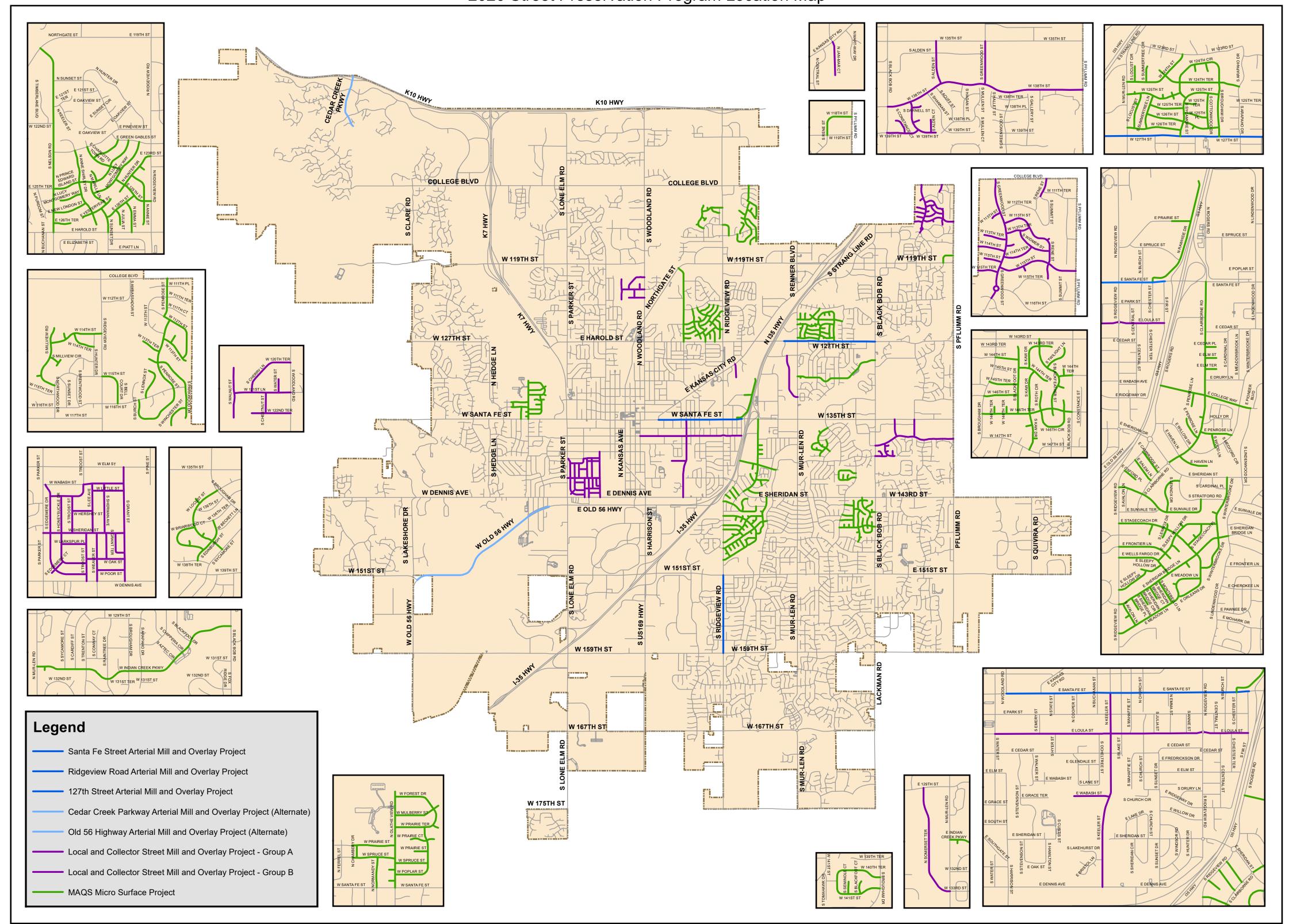

Consideration of Engineer's Estimate, acceptance of bids and award of contract to VF Anderson Builders, LLC for the construction of the Lake Side Acres Street Reconstruction Project, PN 3-R-002-20; the Lake Side Acres Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Project, PN 1-R-104-17; and the Stevenson Street Stormwater Improvements Project, PN 2-C-014-18.

SUMMARY:

On February 5, 2020, three (3) bids were received and opened for the above referenced project. The bids ranged from \$3,542,136.85 to \$4,224,947.50 with an Engineer's Estimate at \$4,545,663.50. VF Anderson Builders, LLC submitted the low and responsible bid in the amount of \$3,542,136.85. The following is a tabulation of the bids received:

This project will provide full street reconstruction of E. Sheridan Street, S. Stevenson Street, E. Oak Street, S. Hamilton Street, S. Hamilton Circle, and S. Curtis Street; rehabilitate structurally failing sanitary sewers in the Lake Side Acres neighborhood which were identified in the Neighborhood Rehabilitation Program as requiring replacement; and address street and house flooding along S. Stevenson Street near E. Sheridan Street, alleviating flood risk to eight (8) homes.

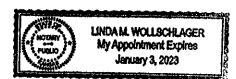

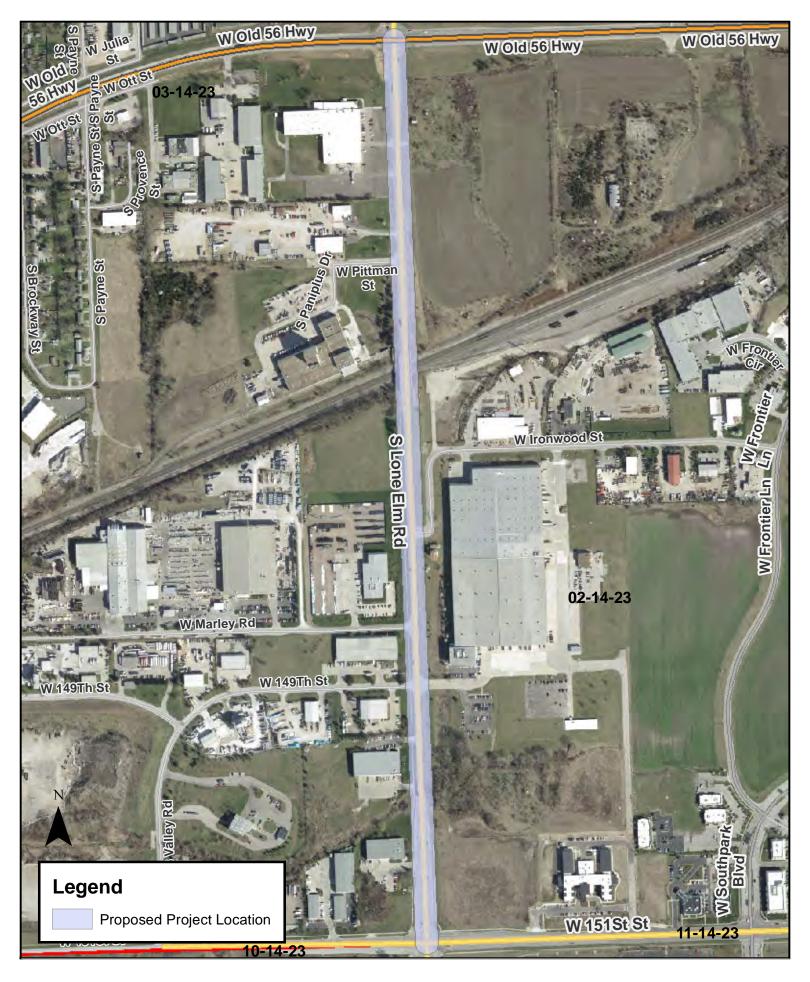

Improvements will include storm sewer, streetlights, on-street bike lanes, landscaping and sidewalks. Also included in this project will be modifications to the existing bridge over the railroad to provide pedestrian access.

The original Professional Services Agreement with HDR Engineering, Inc. (HDR) was approved by the City Council on November 7, 2017 and provided design services for the widening of Lone Elm Road to a 4-lane divided arterial. Since, supplemental agreements have been approved to accommodate for the design of the displaced left turn (DLT) intersection at Old 56 Highway and Lone Elm Road, sidewalks along Old 56 Highway from Lone Elm Road to Robinson Drive, additional load ratings for the bridge as requested by KDOT and the design of a collector street from 151st Street to the north at an existing drive approximately 1,000 LF east of Lone Elm Road.

This Supplemental Agreement No. 6 provides for additional design services necessary to complete the design of the bridge widening including the eight aesthetic columns associated with the bridge design. Also included in this supplemental are construction observation services for the Lone Elm bridge over BNSF and the project retaining walls.

The total fee for the additional professional services provided with Supplemental Agreement No. 6 is \$278,811, which raises the total fees for all services provided under the Agreement from \$1,317,660 to \$1,596,471.

WHEREAS, this Supplemental Agreement No. 6 between the parties heretofore is to provide Additional Professional Services for providing bridge construction drawings not included in the original contract, design of 8 decorative bridge column aesthetics, and field observation services for the Lone Elm Road bridge over the BNSF and project retaining walls for the Project as outlined in Exhibit A of this Supplemental Agreement No. 6, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference; and

WHEREAS, the City is desirous of entering into Supplemental Agreement No. 6 to pay the Consultant for additional services rendered to the City related to the Project; and

WHEREAS, the City is authorized and empowered to contract with the Consultant for the necessary additional professional services under the Agreement, and necessary funds for the payment of said services related to the Project are available and authorized under the Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereby agree as follows:

The SERVICES in EXHIBIT B of the Agreement is hereby amended as follows: Α. See Exhibit A.

B. The total fee for the aforementioned additional professional services provided pursuant to this Supplemental Agreement No. 6 is \$278,811, which raises the total fee for all services provided under the Agreement from One million, three hundred and seventeen thousand, and six-hundred and sixty dollars (\$1,317,660.00) to One million, five hundred and ninety-six thousand, and four-hundred and seventy-one dollars (\$1,596,471.00).

IN ALL OTHER RESPECTS, the terms and conditions of the Agreement will remain in full force and effect, except as specifically modified by this Supplemental Agreement No. <u>6</u>, including all policies of insurance which will cover the work authorized by this Supplemental Agreement No. <u>6</u>.

EXHIBIT A

Description of Services for Supplemental Agreement No. 6

This scope of services includes additional services to the original Design Consultant contract Project No. 3-C-084-17 "Lone Elm Road, Old 56 Highway to 151st Street Improvements" executed on November 7th, 2017. The additional services include providing bridge construction drawings and design effort not included in the original contract, design and construction documents for decorative bridge column aesthetics, and field observation services during 2020 construction of the Lone Elm Road bridge over the BNSF and the project retaining walls. The additional services are outlined below.

General Design Requirements

The consultant shall design the Project in conformity with the City of Olathe, KDOT, and federal design criteria appropriate for the Project in accordance with parameters outlined in the Original Agreement.

The additional services include:

Task 1: Supplement to Original Contract (Lone Elm Bridge over BNSF Final Design)

A. During the final design and detailing phase of the Lone Elm Bridge widening, the sheet list and design tasks increased above the original Scope of Services and Supplement #3. The original sheet list included 14 bridge sheets plus an extra 2 sheets for column aesthetics in Supplement #3 for a total of 16 sheets. The Final Plan submittal totaled in 35 bridge sheets plus two sheets of bridge approach slabs requiring modification to accommodate the concrete barrier and fence.

Additional tasks required during final design but also not identified in the Original Agreement include:

- 1) Fencing and handrail details for the bridge,
- 2) Roadway approach slab and abutment modifications,
- 3) Moment slab and barrier located adjacent to the NW corner of the bridge and approach roadway,
- 4) Abutment modifications for bridge sidewalk posts and approach slab seat and
- 5) Required pier cap strengthening.

These components were not identified until following Field Check design and were not assumed during the Original Agreement. Due to the complexities of the bridge design (widening an existing shallow steel girder bridge without adding additional foundation elements below ground and by the RR tracks), it was necessary for HDR to use more experienced senior staff during the steel framing and post tensioned pier cap design. Below is a description of each additional task that corresponds to the requested hour supplement.

- 1. Bridge General Notes and Quantity Sheet. Only one sheet included in original agreement, but two sheets were needed due to the amount of necessary KDOT standard notes and pay items in the summary table. (1 additional sheet)
- 2. Construction Layout Sheet (no change)
- 3. (Items 3 and 4 from fee sheet) Abutment Modification Detail Sheets. Two sheets were originally contracted and a total of four sheets for the abutments were necessary for the final plans. A sheet for bridge demo limits, including the abutments, and an abutment strip drain were added. Since the City and HDR concluded new approach slabs were required to provide a smoother ride transition at the ends of the bridge, the approach slab pedestal was added to the abutment as well as a strip drain behind the abutment per KDOT standards. Pipe penetrations thru the abutment were needed for the two conduits at each side of the bridge. Also the sidewalk column posts added additional detailing needs at the abutments and the wingwall extensions to accommodate the revised grading around the abutment wingwalls (2 additional sheets).
- 5. Steel Girder Framing Plan Sheet (no change)
- **6-7. Steel Design and Detailing.** The original agreement assumed two steel detail sheets, but only one sheet was required for the details. However, the amount of additional effort required to design the steel framing overhang brackets used the hours allotted for this extra sheet. Also, additional engineer design time was needed since the capacity of the existing girders was closely maxed out and design steps were needed

to satisfy Design Code requirements for the bridge widening. This effort was not anticipated in the original agreement and this work required senior staff due to complexities and interpretation of the AASHTO Design Code.

- 8. Slab Plan Sheets. One sheet assumed in original agreement. In order to properly detail both the top and bottom mattes of rebar in the deck, the typical section of the bridge, and sidewalk overhang, two sheets were added. Additional sheets will aid the field construction process in interpreting rebar layout in the deck specifically around the aesthetic columns at the corners of the bridge. (2 additional sheet)
- 9. Slab Repair Detail Sheet. (no change)
- 10. Concrete Barrier Sheets. Only one sheet was assumed in original agreement, assuming dual dimensioning to cover both the left and right barrier. However, since the barrier limits were extended to include the concrete approach slabs and moment slab (not originally scoped) additional sheets were needed. A sheet for both left and right barrier were needed plus cross sections and other barrier details that were specific to the layout of the guardrail at each corner of the bridge. (3 additional sheets)
- 11. Decorative Fence Detail Sheets, Outside Edges of Bridge. One sheet was assumed for the fence with dual dimensioning assumed in original agreement. Fence limited eliminated the ability to use dual dimensions, and in the final plans a sheet for both left and right was required in addition to the fence details. The lengths and heights of each fence were different, requiring the need to show the aesthetic bridge/sidewalk columns on fence details. (2 additional sheets)
- 12. Handrail on Top of Concrete Barrier Detail Sheets. Original agreement assumed one sheet for the handrail also assuming dual dimensioning. But with the barrier extended onto the approach slabs and moment slab, a sheet for both left and right was required in addition to a fence detail sheet. The lengths and heights of each fence were different, requiring the need to show the aesthetic columns with the fence details. (2 additional sheets)
- 13. Utility Support Detail Sheet (no change)
- 14. Rebar Bar Bill Sheet (no change)
- B. Bridge Final Plans Sheets not assume or listed in the original agreement
 - 1. Pier Overhang Post Tensioning Detail Sheet. Due to the additional dead load added to the bridge with the sidewalk overhang, it was determined during final design that the pier cap overhangs needed to be strengthened to carry this load. A post tensioning design was completed and detailed on one additional sheet. (1 additional sheet)
 - 2. Moment Slab Sheet. None assumed in original agreement. Cast-in-place retaining wall was needed at the NW corner of the bridge to keep additional side slope fill surcharge off the existing MSE retaining wall by private property, a concrete barrier along the roadway and limits of the wall is required to protect the drop off at the wall. The concrete barrier is required anchorage to a foundation to resist traffic impact loads and moment slab is a standard method of design. (1 additional sheet). Moment slab detailing for the retaining wall in the NW quadrant of the CFI intersection was also not assumed during the original agreement.
 - 3. Standard Bridge Sheets. Five additional KDOT Standard Bridge drawings/details were required in the final plans that were not assumed in the original agreement. (5 additional sheets)
 - 4. Bridge Approach Slab Sheets. The original agreement did not include bridge approach slab sheets. Following the a field evaluation of the bridge HDR, the City and HDR both agreed that approach slabs at each end of the bridge are needed. This added 4 sheets to the plans with 2 of those sheets detailing required modifications with concrete barrier, handrail, fencing over the RR and sidewalk column posts. The approach slab rebar plan view layout was modified to accommodate the project requirements on the bridge. (4 additional sheets)
- C. Additional Bridge Quantity Calculations. Additional effort was required for quantity calculations for additional plan sheets and bridge components in Task 1.01. A. 1-14 and B. 1-4.
- D. Quality Control and Quality Assurance. Additional effort was required for the quality control and assurance for the additional plan sheets and details in Task 1.01. A. 1-14 and B. 1-4.

Task 2: Bridge Column Aesthetics

Bridge and Sidewalk Column (8 total) Aesthetics Details. Development of bridge aesthetic features was requested by the City prior to the Office Check submittal stage. Several options were developed and edited during this period, and a final concept was developed and selected by the City prior to the submittal of final plans. Task 2 includes scope of services not assumed in the original agreement including column decorative graphics, graphic details, column lighting system design and details, power source details, concrete forming details, specification of materials and components, bidding services, and submittal reviews. Detailed tasks include:

- A. Develop single option for column graphics and lighting. Option will be based on Lone Elm tree graphic on the traffic and sidewalk approach sides for each of the 8 bridge sidewalk columns. Graphics for columns will be created using concrete formliner and decorative lighting of the 8 columns.
- B. Prepare construction drawings for column graphics
- C. Modify existing bridge column drawings and detail sheets from PS&E Plans
- D. Bridge Column Lighting modify street lighting plans to include column lighting
- E. Prepare specifications and bidding phase services
- F. Construction phase review submittals

Task 3: Construction Phase Field Observation Services (Bridge and Retaining Walls)

Supplement the Olathe construction administration staff by providing daily field construction observation for the Lone Elm Roadway bridge, bridge approach pavement, barrier, guardrail, column aesthetics, and bridge components. HDR will provide daily observation of the proposed improvements shown in the bridge plans for the above mentioned bridge and bridge components of work. (City of Olathe will observe the remainder of the roadway and overall project improvements). Field observation for the structural construction will include performing daily diary, verification of contractor quantities, approval of pay application (for bridge and structural work), and observation of the work and performance per the project/Olathe/KDOT specifications and construction manual requirements. (Does not include materials testing for field services beyond observation staff manpower)

HDR's field observation services and service time will be limited to the anticipated schedule for the bridge construction. The schedule for the bridge construction observation is assumed to be four (4) months at 10 hours/day. It is assumed that the contractor will begin the bridge demolition by 4/2020, and be completed with the bridge construction by 8/2020. Approximately one week of both construction observation mobilization and close-out completion are assumed for the field staff.

- A. 1/2 Month: Bridge start-up & pre-construction services
 - 1. Pre-construction meeting, miscellaneous coordination with City construction administration staff, with BNSF, and contractor
 - 2. Field Observation mobilization and pre-construction services
- B. Month 1 Field Observation (22 working days)
 - 1. Daily Field observation of bridge and retaining walls. Attend field progress meetings.
- C. Month 2 Field Observation (22 working days)
 - 1. Daily Field observation of bridge and retaining walls. Attend field progress meetings.
- D. Month 3 Field Observation (21 working days)
 - 1. Daily Field observation of bridge and retaining walls. Attend field progress meetings.
- E. Month 4 Field Observation (22 working days)
 - 1. Daily Field observation of bridge and retaining walls. Attend field progress meetings.
- F. 1/2 Month: Bridge completion and close-out Field Observation

- 1. Post-construction meeting, coordination with City, final preparation of field record set drawings for asbuilt preparation, BNSF and contractor final coordination.
- 2. Closeout

G. Project Management

- 1. Communication and Coordination with City of Olathe
- 2. Invoicing/Scheduling/Budgeting
- 3. Public Meeting pre-construction "meet the contractor"

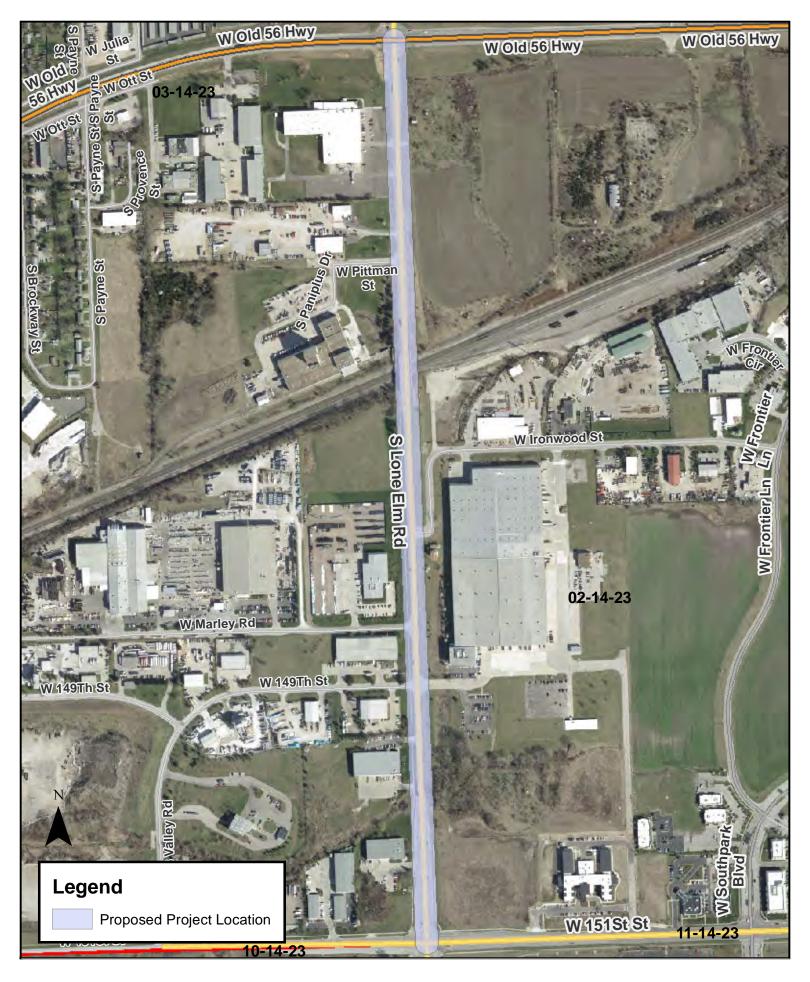

ITEM DESCRIPTION:

Consideration of a Relocation Agreement with Evergy Kansas Central, Inc. for the Mahaffie Circle Improvements Project, PN 3-C-107-17.

SUMMARY:

The Mahaffie Circle Improvements Project will extend Mahaffie Circle from its existing terminus north of 151st Street to the intersection of Old 56 Highway and Church Street. Improvements include extending the bridge over the railroad on I-35, pavement, curb and gutter, storm sewer, streetlights, and sidewalks. A new 12" waterline is also being installed along the new roadway to enhance water pressure issues on the east side of I-35.

This agreement is in place to reimburse Evergy Kansas Central, Inc. (Evergy) for deenergizing and removing portions of their overhead distribution lines above I-35 to allow work on the I-35 bridge work for the Mahaffie Circle Improvements Project. The total cost of the reimbursement is \$71,868.37.

Construction of the extension of Mahaffie Circle is scheduled to be completed by late summer 2020.

This Letter Agreement is entered into the date indicated above for the limited purpose of providing assurance to Evergy Kansas Central, Inc. ("Evergy") that its costs for the Work agreed to herein will be paid by City of Olathe ("City").

Evergy's Responsibility

- 1. Evergy will construct power lines and related facilities in good and workmanlike manner and in accordance with industry standards to supply a temporary relocation of electric distribution facilities within existing Evergy private easement ("the Work") for the I-35 Bridge project ("I-35 Bridge").
- 2. Evergy will deenergize and remove approximately 1000 feet of overhead distribution lines in conflict with bridge construction plans. These lines are to be reinstalled upon completion of I-35 Bridge project construction.
- 3. Evergy will advance all costs necessary to complete the Work and will maintain invoices and related documents with sufficient detail of the time, materials, and unit costs to satisfy the City's verification of the costs.
- 4. The quantity of pole locations ("unit(s)") located within the Work is estimated at 7 unit(s).
- 5. The estimated unit(s) price to complete the Work is \$10,266.91.
- 6. Evergy shall provide the City with the right and authority to review, audit, and copy, Evergy's books and records related to the Work (including, but not limited to, contractor's statements, general contracts, subcontracts, material purchase orders, waivers of lien, paid receipts, and invoices), up to six months after completion of the Work
- 7. Evergy will coordinate the installation of the power lines and related facilities with the City's contractor to ensure the construction of the I-35 Bridge Project is not unnecessarily delayed.
- 8. Evergy, for itself, and any contractor with whom Evergy has contracted for performance of the Work agrees to not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, creed, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation, disability, national origin, gender identity or ancestry.
- 9. Evergy will use all reasonable efforts to complete all work by March 31, 2019. Provided, however, that Evergy's timely performance is subject to and conditioned upon weather conditions and such other matters and conditions as in Evergy's sole discretion impact the operation of its electric transmission and distribution system.

City's Responsibility

1. Upon completion of the project, City agrees to pay the cost of the estimate. As such, City owes \$71,868.37. Evergy will provide City with a final statement of unit(s) quantity and cost after completion of the project and City shall have two months from invoice date to make final payment of the total amount due.

ADDITIONAL TERMS:

- The General Terms and Conditions of Evergy's Tariff as currently approved by the Kansas Corporation Commission shall apply to the Work and to the electric service provided to the City by Evergy.
- Evergy will comply with all laws and ordinances applicable to the Work or its performance.
- Evergy will maintain insurance policies of the types and amounts indicated below while working on City property to complete the Work:
 - o Commercial General Liability \$1 million per occurrence; \$2 million general aggregate
 - o Workers Compensation at levels required by the State in which the Work is performed
 - o Automobile Liability covering all vehicles used by Evergy in connection with the Work at no less than \$1 million combined single limit.
- City warrants that it has the necessary legal rights to the site upon which Evergy has been asked to perform the Work, and that it is authorized to enter into this Agreement.

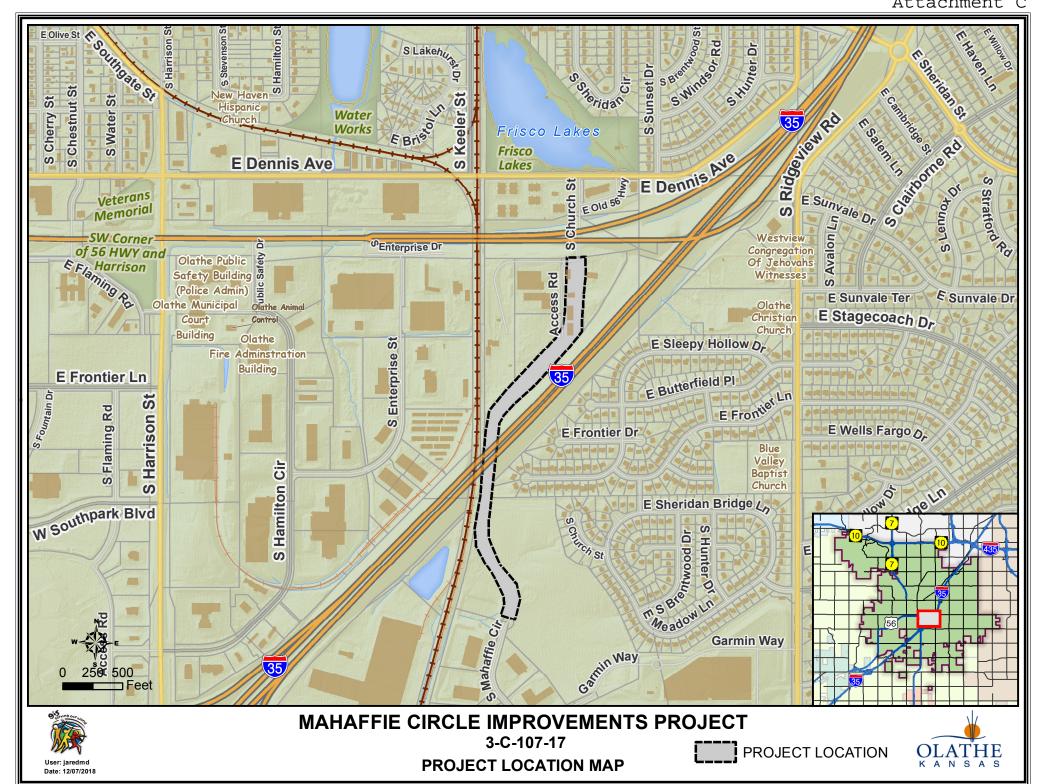

Consideration of renewal of contract to CES Industrial Piping Supply LLC for the purchase of high-density polyethylene pipe & fittings and the rental of fusion equipment for the Public Works Department.

SUMMARY: In 2016, one (1) bid was received for high density polyethylene (HDPE) pipe and rental of fusion equipment. As part of the City's efforts to maintain water and sewer infrastructure, City construction crews currently replace over 7,000 feet of water and sewer mains. The HDPE pipe is used to replace deteriorated water and sewer pipes that have reached the end of their useful life and are prone to failures. This is done specifically where trenchless excavation can be used to minimize excavation and restoration costs and reduce the impact on the neighborhood. This contract will provide the HDPE pipe and the rental of equipment for fusing (joining) of pipe segments.

The City spent approximately \$189,700 to CES Industrial Supply LLC in 2019. Staff estimates spending \$125,000 each year for a total of \$250,000 over the two-year renewal period.

CES Industrial Piping was awarded a three (3) year contract with the option of two (2) additional contract years. Staff recommends renewal of contract for two (2) years to CES Industrial Piping Supply LLC

Acceptance of bids and consideration of award of contract to NSG Brown's, LLC for the replacement of the membrane piping at Water Treatment Plant #2.

SUMMARY: On January 8, 2020 one (1) bid was received for the replacement of membrane piping at Water Treatment Plant #2. This piping is 15 years old and handles the water for all seven membrane filtration racks. In 2019, numerous welding repairs were performed because of leaks in the piping. Leaks in the pipes keep increasing and after investigation staff found that the piping wall thickness varies in the piping and the leaks are occurring at the joints where the pipe wall thickness changes to thinner material. Replacing the piping is the best solution to avoid having to shut down the entire membrane system, which would reduce the plant's capacity by 40%.

Staff recommends award of contract to NSG Brown's, LLC.

54 vendors were notified of this bidding opportunity, one was a local vendor. The local company does not perform this type of work. Staff reached out to vendors who perform this type of work in the area but did not bid on the project and found that they prefer larger projects, or they have a large backlog of work and weren't able to bid at this time.

\$97,540 to be paid from the Water Treatment Plant operating budget.

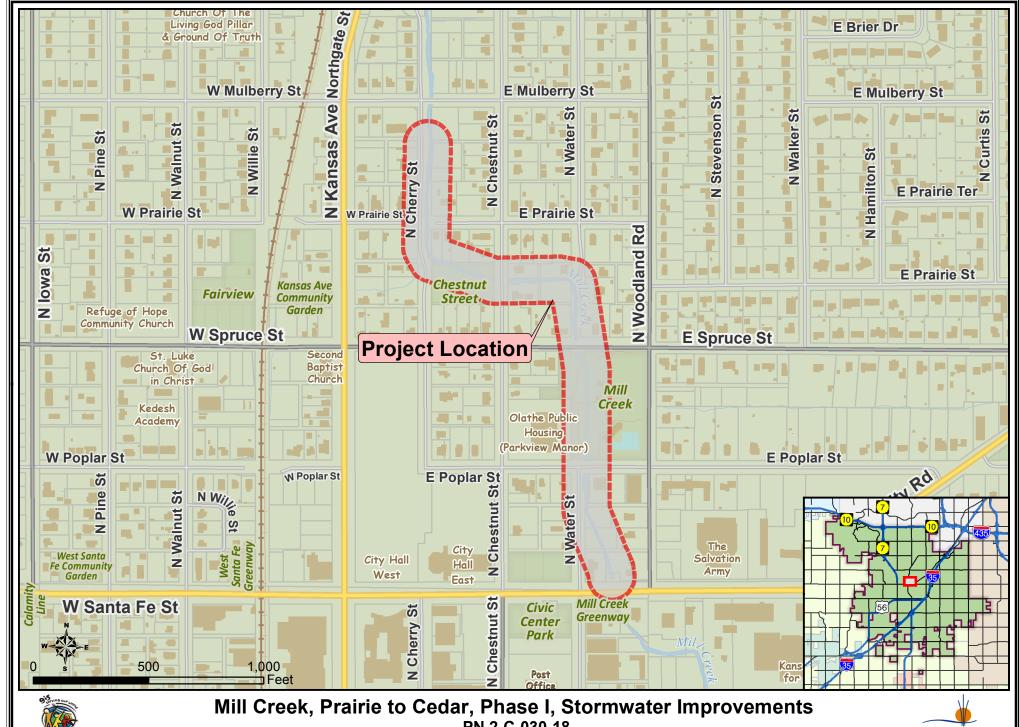

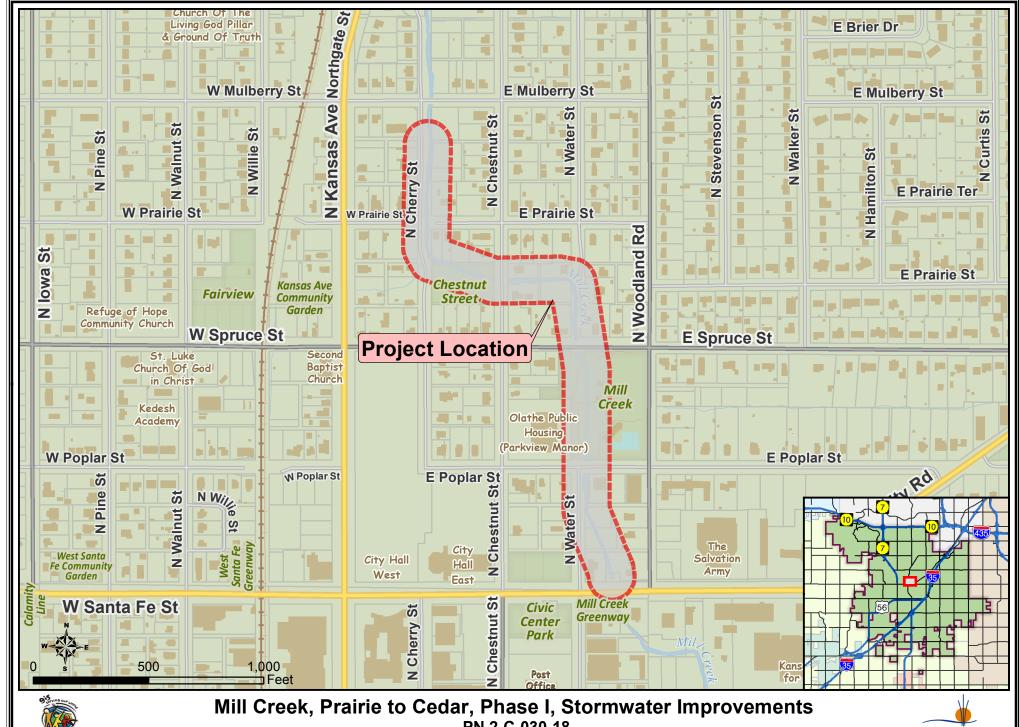

SUMMARY:

The draft 2020 Federal Legislative Priority statement again provides a policy level filter for assessing and advocating for/against federal legislative initiatives. The priorities were established based input from departments, organizations such as MARC and NLC as well as guidance from Congressional staff. It follows the Council practice of focusing on City specific issues.

This year's proposed statement extends appreciation to the delegation for supporting our BUILD Grant application for the 119th/I-35 Interchange project, and lays the groundwork for upcoming funding requests for proposed projects. In addition, it proposes taking a stand in support of expanding Congressional authority to appropriately return Olathe federal tax dollars to Olathe infrastructure projects.

Again this year, we ask our federal delegation to remain vigilant in monitoring the reasonableness of federal environmental issues, including water quality issues. It addresses unreasonable financial burdens created by issues such as eliminating or reducing tax exemption for municipal bonds. Other key standing issues include forcing local governments to recognize collective bargaining, federal mandates and preserving local control.

Per Council direction, significant proposed changes from the previous year are highlighted.

FEDERAL ISSUES OF INTEREST TO THE CITY OF OLATHE, KANSAS February 18, 2020

DRAFT

Overview:

The City of Olathe truly values the strong working relationship and open lines of communication with our Congressional delegation. We recognize our successful partnership serving Olathe taxpayers and we are committed to their best interest. We thank our delegation for the essential support in securing BUILD Grant funding the 119th/I-35 Interchange project. It would not have happened without it.

The City applauds our delegation's continued understanding of our priorities and efforts to support them. Again this year, the priorities are based on fundamental themes.

The first is ensuring that any funding cuts, including grants that support a federally mandated program or project, include elimination of the accompanying mandate. If not, they are not spending cuts but a cost pass-through to local taxpayers.

The second tenet applies to truly defining a spending cut or federal revenue enhancement. Hijacking other revenue or accounts such as the Asset Forfeiture Program to address the deficit is not a cut. It is simply a transfer of monies established and collected for one important program to fill a gap in another. The same concern applies to enhancing federal revenue by **taxing local bonds**. Ultimately, taxpayers will bear the brunt of the cost at a different level, and it could have a significant impact on local governments' ability to fund infrastructure projects and promote economic growth.

The city believes local voter and local taxpayer voices should not be muted by taking local decisions out of their control. Concerns about adding environmental regulation with no measureable return and significant costs are a key example.

The city has effectively invested federal infrastructure dollars to generate economic development, job creation and investment in Kansas. This federal assistance along with significant local investment has directly led to thousands of jobs and hundreds of millions of dollars in investment. The City intends to continue that track record as we bring funding support requests to our delegation. While we have no specific requests this year, we do have several

projects in the future for the delegation understand that outlined at the end of this document.

Lastly, we recognize and honor our taxpayers' responsibility to support our federal government. Likewise, we fully support our delegations' efforts to return a portion of that money to local infrastructure needs. That includes supporting appropriate legislative and/or administrative changes allowing the delegation to do as effectively as possible.

Transportation

- The City applauds Congress's efforts to fund our national transportation system and recognizes this is a prudent and wise investment. The City has concerns, however, about funding for an interchange within local jurisdictions. These infrastructure projects are not only essential for traffic management, but also for economic development and growth in Kansas. Moving forward, the City hopes a sustainable and stable funding source will be identified and implemented.
- The City supports continued funding of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act, or FAST
- The City support efforts to increase federal investment in infrastructure with reasonable and responsible funding mechanisms.
- The City supports retaining funding for FTA 5310. The City uses this funding
 to support the Olathe Taxi Coupon Program. The City believes consideration
 should be given to adjusting the allocation program to create competitive
 grants for metropolitan agencies rather than allocating all funding through the
 Kansas City Area Transportation Authority.
- Potential upcoming projects included on page 9

Labor and Employment

- Believing that the state and federal governments should not intervene in local government employee relations, the City strongly opposes legislation granting special employment rights to public safety personnel, namely collective bargaining.
- The City opposes extension of OSHA regulations to local government.
 The City already has federal, insurance industry, and self-imposed regulations and oversight of workplace safety.
- The City supports legislation that would repeal the Davis-Bacon Act applicable to construction projects assisted with federal funds. This Act raises construction costs on public projects and adds administrative burden.

As an alternative, the City would support legislation that increases the \$2,000 threshold for the Act.

Federal Budget & Tax Legislation

- The City recognizes the unique economic situation facing our nation. Within
 this environment, the City supports a federal budget plan that does not
 disproportionately target municipal assistance programs for reduction,
 including community development block grants. If municipal assistance
 funding is cut, the City asks the Delegation to support reduction in federal
 mandates and their associated costs that are equal to or greater than the
 funding cut.
- Tax exempt status for municipal bonds saves taxpayers millions of dollars in Kansas, and any effort to change that status will directly cost them. The City opposes efforts to increase taxpayer costs of bond issuance with little to no real cost savings for taxpayers.

Public Safety

- The City of Olathe's police and fire departments are responsible for administering and/or assisting in a multitude of federal programs. In addition, each department is tasked to enforce a number of federal laws and regulations. To fulfill those charges as well as their many traditional public safety duties, the departments take advantage of a number of federal programs and initiatives.
 - > FIRE ACT programs provide direct funding to local fire and EMS departments for training, education, and specialized equipment.
 - Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Act (SAFER) assists local fire departments in meeting adequate staffing levels.
 - ➤ Local Law Enforcement Block Grant (LLEBG) enables cities to improve public safety services under the previous allocation formulas.
 - ➤ BJA Edward Byrne Grant provides for police equipment that cannot be obtained through local revenues.
 - > BJA Ballistic Vest Program (BVP) supports replacement of police vests.
 - Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) program supports community policing efforts and additional transitional funding to help communities absorb the long-term cost of COPS funded officers and programs.
 - The City supports re-evaluating new formulas that have redirected money to other areas.

- The City believes the federal government should honor its commitment to the Asset Forfeiture Program. The program uses a portion of seized assets to reimburse local law enforcement agencies costs from partnering with federal agencies. The City believes this partnership is critical to federal law enforcement. However, local governments cannot afford to participate without financial reimbursement. The City is currently owed more than \$159,000 from cases going back nearly 10 years.
- The City has concerns about federal immigration enforcement initiatives that require additional local enforcement without corresponding financial assistance. The City supports meaningful immigration reform with strong consideration and inclusion of local interests and impacts.
- The City calls on the federal government to recognize local governments as key players in homeland security. The City supports the First Responder initiative that would provide direct homeland security funding to local governments. The City supports efforts to ensure funds directed to states are filtered down to first responders and efforts to ensure funds for regional public safety interoperability, especially with regard to communications and information sharing.
- The City supports maintaining smaller metropolitan areas such as Kansas City inclusion in the Urban Area Security Initiative.
- While the City does not have specific programs providing care for those with mental health challenges and typically does not advocate for programs outside its scope of services, the lack of adequate mental heath treatment at the state and county level is creating an ever-growing unfunded mandate for local governments such as Olathe. In large part due to this gap, the City incurs significant cost in time and resources confronting this challenge. The City supports adequate federal funding to the appropriate levels of government as well as accountability for the use of those funds.

Housing and Community Development

• The City has a long history of participation in CDBG, Section 8, Public Housing, and homeless programs that have a significant impact on our qualifying residents locally as well as those throughout the state. The majority of participants in the City's program are senior and/or disabled persons who cannot support themselves without assistance. In addition, the City funds its Taxi Coupon Program for seniors and/or the disabled using CDBG funds. The program is the only means available for transportation to employment, as well as necessary medical and other trips. The City partners with the federal government to maintain 130 housing units, and the City is not in a financial position to assume the costs for this federal program. The City urges Congress to avoid elimination or disproportionate funding reduction for housing and community development programs. The City supports

responsible and reasonable funding levels of the CDBG program. With inflation and the increasing number of entitlement jurisdictions, CDBG set asides have resulted in smaller block grants.

- The City is opposed to federal government disproportionate funding reductions for the Section 8 Voucher Program administration fees, public housing operating funds, and capital improvement funding under public housing. Given previous funding reduction, inspection and certification requirements should be reduced for fixed income program participants.
- The City supports FY 2020 funding of at least \$19.3 million for the 49 authorized National Heritage Areas, including Freedom's Frontier. For more than thirty years, National Heritage Areas have developed unique private-public partnerships to protect, preserve and promote unique landscapes and American stories. This funding has been invaluable to sites in Kansas, including Olathe's Mahaffie Stagecoach Stop and Farm.

Environment

- The City applauds our Congressional delegations for its assistance in addressing the recent EPA interpretation of the Clean Water Act regarding secondary treatment of influent. As originally proposed, local water and sewer utilities would be required to treat water that already meets or exceeds EPA guidelines, and the cost for Olathe will run in the millions of dollars. The City truly appreciates the delegation's willingness to remain engaged in this critical issue.
- The City opposes any EPA mandates and/or actions impacting local governments that result in significant cost with little to no measurable return on the investment and/or true positive environmental impact.
- In order for governments at all levels to be sustainable, they must invest in the enhancement and upkeep of water and wastewater infrastructure. Doing otherwise will create an incredibly dangerous financial situation. To address a significant gap between public funding and capital needs to meet environmental standards, the City supports efforts to ensure the federal financial commitment to water and wastewater infrastructure. These funds are allocated to states to capitalize state administered grants and revolving loan programs.
- As a municipality with an integrated solid waste management system with strong interest in waste diversion through recycling, the City would support recycling market development for e-waste; however, the City opposes

legislation to ban landfill disposal of e-waste as an additional unfunded mandate.

- The City supports the practice of wet-weather blending as a sound, effective and reasonable method of managing peak effluent flows during extreme wet weathers. The City supports legislative efforts to ensure this practice of blending primary treated wastewater effluent with wastewater effluent that has received biological treatment continues to be available to wastewater treatment utilities.
- To address the source water protection challenges facing drinking water suppliers, the City opposes the elimination of programs that provide federal financial assistance to afford urban and urbanizing communities the resources to engage in source water protection efforts for drinking water supplies.
- The City supports continuation of full funding of the Land and Water Conservation fund for state and local entities. The City is concerned about vast majority of this funding has been redirected to federal projects to the detriment of state and local governments.

Telecommunications

- The City supports the widespread deployment of high speed, or broadband information services in a manner that does not preempt existing local government authority to regulate cable television or telecommunications entities.
- The City opposes any efforts under E-911 that would preempt local zoning authority over the siting of wireless facilities.
- The City opposes efforts to undermine local taxpayer control of right-ofway and above ground infrastructure that includes small cell wireless deployment.

Upcoming Projects:

Currently, the City anticipates pursuing assistance for the following upcoming projects.

- I-35 and Santa Fe improvements Like 119th and I-35, Santa Fe has reached capacity causing significant regional traffic challenges. Ultimately, improvements will require additional lanes on I-35 and redesign and updates to the existing interchange. The City anticipates being in a position to pursue federal support in 2022 for 2023 funding.
- **167th and US 169 Improvement and Overpass** This high growth corridor will see significant investment in both commercial and residential growth. As a result, the City will be exploring opportunities to address both traffic and railroad safety issues with an overpass at 167th over US 169 and the BNSF railroad tracks. We anticipate exploring funding sources such as INFRA Grant as well as partnering with the State of Kansas. Request for support is anticipated between 2021 and 2023.
- Widening K-10 from K-7 to Gateway/I-435/I-35 The K-10 Corridor is expected to see continued incredible growth and will be an economic engine for the state. While this project will likely be led by KDOT, the City will fully support funding request that could include a BUILD Grant or other funding opportunities.
- Addressing Challenges of the western BNSF tracks The western BNSF tracks passing through downtown Olathe include one of the state's highest traffic atgrade rail crossing. The tracks see over 80 trains daily, and those trains create significant traffic delays and hinder economic development. While raising the rails similar to the east tracks may be one option, the City is actively exploring effective solutions to this challenge. The City anticipates exploring INFRA or other federal funding as we move forward.

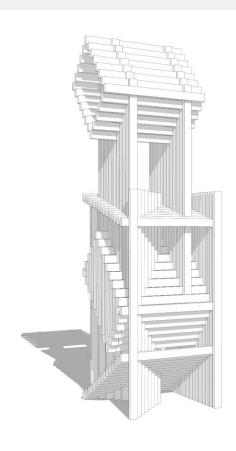

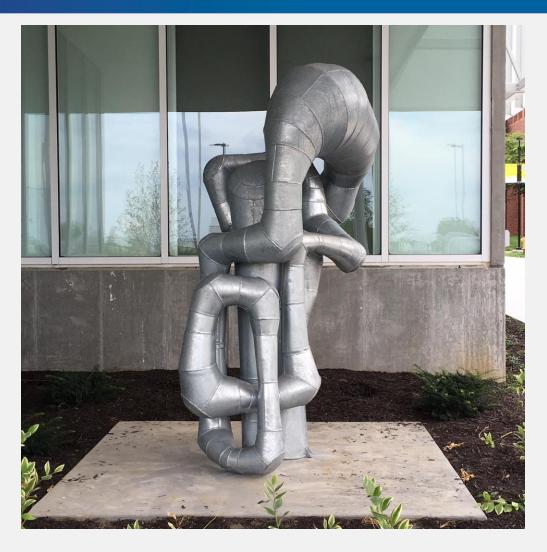

ITEM DESCRIPTION:

Discussion on the I-35 & 119th Street Interchange Improvements Project, PN 3-C-026-16.

SUMMARY:

The I-35 & 119th Street interchange carries over 50,000 vehicles per day and is heavily congested in the AM and PM peak hour. This project will include the reconfiguration of the existing bridge over I-35 from its current layout to a diverging diamond interchange (DDI). Also included in the project will be the construction of three thru lanes from Renner Blvd to Strang Line Road, the widening of the bridges over BNSF to accommodate these three lanes, geometric improvements at Renner Blvd and upgrades to the pedestrian facilities in the area.

In October of 2019, this project was awarded \$10,000,000 in BUILD Grant funding for construction in 2021/2022. The project will also receive \$5,000,000 in KDOT funds for construction and construction engineering.

The project is currently in the final design and land acquisition phases with utility relocations tentatively scheduled for later this year and construction to begin in 2021.

This presentation will provide information on the proposed aesthetics associated with the project.

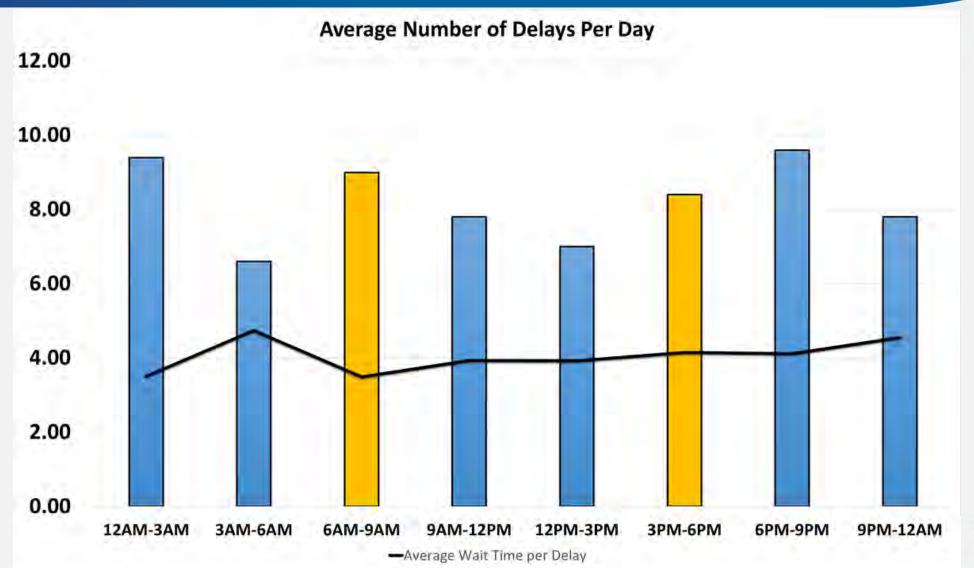
